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## INTRODUCTION

In June, 1964, the Special Committee on Mental Health Services of the California State Assembly published "A Preliminary Proposal to Eliminate Waiting Lists for State Hospitals for the Mentally Retarded".\*

This supplementary factual report is the first in a series of documents designed to provide additional information relating to the "Preliminary Proposal".

The "Preliminary Proposal" attempts to implement the recommendations advanced in the "Long Range Plan for Mental Health Services in California", (Department of Mental Hygiene 1962). One of the major ideas contained in the Long Range Plan and in the Preliminary Proposal is expressed in recommendations for expanding the use of community based proprietary and non-profit private facilities as an alternative to the construction of additional State hospitals. The Preliminary Proposal outlines the necessary machinery to implement this recommendation.

This report provides new information regarding the private facilities which are now licensed by the Department of Mental Hygiene to care for the mentally retarded. A subsequent report will provide information regarding other community medical and nursing facilities with a potential for conversion to care for the retarded.

The information presented in this report was gathered from a questionnaire submitted to the 225 private facilities licensed by the Department of Mental Hygiene to care for the mentally retarded.

The findings are based on statements made by persons who operate 58.1% of these facilities. The Committee wishes to thank these busy and dedicated people for their conscientious cooperation.

## SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

1. At the present time there are approximately 500 vacancies in private facilities specifically licensed, by the California State Department of Mental Hygiene, to provide residential care for the mentally retarded.

Despite the fact that thousands of children are on waiting lists for State hospitals, licensed private facilities are not fully used. The evidence indicates that lack of funds is a major reason preventing families from placing their children in these facilities. (An important fact is that over 55% of the families who have placed retarded children in private facilities are receiving some form of public assistance to help them pay for all, or part of, the cost of care. This fact suggests that low income families who are eligible for financial assistance and upper income families who can better afford the long-term expense are able to make greater use of private placements than middle income families who cannot manage a continual drain on their family resources.)

2. Almost 50% of the retarded children now in private facilities will eventually go to State hospitals.

The directors of the facilities surveyed, state that in many cases the reason for transferring children to the State hospital is the inability of families to maintain the cost of private care.\*

3. Eight out of every ten retarded children presently in private facilities are being cared for at a cost less than the \$300 per month minimum estimated cost of care in a State hospital.

4. The Directors of private institutions indicate interest in expanding their programs and facilities, but state that they are

handicapped in the following ways:

- a) Few families are able to pay for the cost of private care, private institutions hesitate to increase their fees. As a result, many of the programs are not as comprehensive as they might be if they had funds to employ a variety of specialists or improve their physical facilities.
- b) Loans for facility expansion are difficult to get because of the insecure economic position of institutions which are unable to guarantee they will be filled to the extent of meeting their fixed costs.
- c) There is a lack of communication and coordination between the various agencies that place retarded children. Consequently there is a need for a plan which could coordinate placement activities to make better use of private facilities.
- d) Many respondents stated that unrealistic policies and dual licensing procedures hamper their ability to care for more children.

\*The Committee has directed a questionnaire to every family with a child on the present State hospital waiting list. Responses to that questionnaire will provide additional information on this question and will be published in another "supplementary factual report."

## GENERAL FINDINGS

1. Over half of the private institutions licensed to care for the mentally retarded responded to the questionnaire. The questionnaire was sent to each of the 225 private facilities listed by the Department of Mental Hygiene as licensed to care for the retarded. 131 (58.1%) responded to the questionnaire. The total licensed capacity for all 225 facilities is 2907, while the licensed capacity of the 131 replying institutions is 1947. (The conclusions drawn in the study are based on statements made by persons who operate 66.9% of the licensed private beds in California).

The 225 private facilities are categorized by the Department of Mental Hygiene into four classes according to their size and function:

a) Resident Care facilities are those institutions of seven-bed capacity or more intended solely for the admission of mentally retarded patients whose primary need is protective supervision. 17 facilities are classed as Resident Care, and 9 (52.9%) of these facilities responded to the questionnaire. The total licensed capacity for all Resident Care facilities is 433, and the licensed capacity of the 9 who replied is 252. (Therefore, 58.2% of the Resident Care beds are represented in the conclusions of the study).

b) Nursery facilities are institutions intended primarily for the admission of nonambulatory mentally retarded patients who are provided nursing services in crib accommodations. 98 facilities were classed as nursery facilities, and 59 (60.2%) of these responded to the questionnaire. The total licensed capacity of all Nursery facilities is 721, and the

licensed capacity of the 59 who replied is 485. (67.2% of the Nursery beds figure in the conclusions).

c) Resident School facilities are institutions intended primarily for the admission, care and treatment of educable and trainable mentally retarded patients. A total of 26 institutions are classed as resident school, and 15 (57.7%) replied to the questionnaire. The total licensed capacity for all Resident School facilities is 1428, and the licensed capacity of the 15 who responded to the questionnaire is 1007. (70.5% of the Resident School beds were used in drawing conclusions).\*

d) Family Home facilities are facilities intended solely for the admission of not more than six mentally retarded patients whose primary need is protective supervision in a home setting. A total of 84 such facilities are listed, and 48 (57.1%) responded to the questionnaire. The total licensed capacity for the 84 Family Homes is 325, while the licensed capacity of the 48 who responded is 203. (62.4% of the Family Home beds were represented in the study).

\*These figures represent only the resident licensed capacity, and do not include the number of day care patients these facilities are licensed to serve. If day care services had been included in the study the projected number of vacancies would be about 700. (Although this study was limited to 24-hour care facilities, day care services should not be underestimated as a desirable alternative to hospital placement in many cases. A 1961 study conducted by the Sacramento Community Welfare Council revealed that, in Sacramento, one-fourth of the families with children on the State Hospital waiting list would have preferred day care placement for their children if it were made available).



2. Almost 500 beds are now vacant in the private facilities.


At the time the study was made, 131 facilities were serving 1624 children. The licensed capacity of these facilities is 1947. For these 131 facilities, then, there were 323 or 16.6% of the licensed beds vacant. A projection of this 16.6% vacancy rate to the 94 institutions who did not respond to the questionnaire would result in a figure indicating about 475 beds are now vacant in all private facilities.


Present Vacancies in Institutions  
Responding to Questionnaire




Projected Number of Beds Vacant  
in all Types of Private Facilities




Projected Vacancies by Class of Institution








3. About one half of the children who are presently in private facilities will eventually go to state hospitals. This estimate is based on a question asking those who responded to state the percent of children who leave the private facility to go to state hospitals. A total of 74 institutions responded to this inquiry, and these institutions were caring for a total of 1079 children at the time of the study. The responses indicate that 535 children of the 1079 (49.5%) were destined to go to state hospitals. A projection of this figure to the total approximation of persons now under private care would indicate that there are about 1200 persons now in private facilities who will eventually go to state hospitals. At the time of the survey, 324 persons were on the active hospital waiting list from the 131 institutions.

Eventually Transfer to State Hospitals


4. Eight out of every ten persons presently in private facilities are being cared for at a cost of less than \$300 per month. The monthly rates being paid to the private institutions for the care of 1429 children were broken down into three categories:

- a) 371 (25.9%) are maintained in private institutions at a cost of less than \$150 per month;
- b) 790 (55.4%) are maintained at a cost of \$150 to \$300 per month;
- c) 268 (18.7%) of the children are maintained at a cost in excess of \$300 per month.

Therefore, 1161 (81.3%) are being maintained in private institutions at a cost of less than \$300 per month -- the minimum cost necessary to maintain a child in a State hospital.




5. Less than one-half of the children now in private facilities are totally supported by payments from parents. Private facilities were asked to indicate the source of support of the children under their care. The source of support was indicated for 1534 of the children, and a total of 669 cases (43.6%) were reported as deriving their full cost of tuition from the family. An additional 642 (41.8%) cases were supported with public welfare assistance, while 223 cases (14.6%) received their support from other sources or a combination of sources.

TABLE 6


Source of Support of Persons  
in Private Facilities






Resident Care

Many of the institutions responded to a question inviting suggestions. 109 respondents offered suggestions which they felt would help strengthen their program. The possibilities of different kinds of specific responses to such an invitation are almost infinite, but a majority of the suggestions could be categorized as stemming from four major problems:

1) A source of support for families placing children in private institutions should be established. Many families desire to keep their children in private facilities, but cannot afford to do so without some type of financial assistance.

#### Examples of Responses

"There should be more funds available to place the more severely retarded children in private homes before entering an institution. It has been proven time and time again that a child, with more individual attention, will develop more closely to his fullest capacities than a retarded child who has to be placed in a State hospital. By making funds available to parents before a child is placed in an institution of large size, the financial burden would be lifted from them, the waiting list for the State hospitals would be shortened, and the child would have a better chance of being helped to his fullest capabilities. A retarded child is also a human being and deserves just as great an opportunity to develop as a normal child -- perhaps even more of an opportunity."

"By state and local financial assistance for the many retarded children whose families are in the middle income group, unable to qualify for welfare or probation department assistance. Because this group can meet only a portion of the tuition costs of a program like ours, they are denied much needed services."

"Many educable retarded children should be in residential schools. If only state funds were available to help parents pay their tuition. Private schools have no help from county, state, or federal funds. We must struggle to provide adequate care and teachers on our fees from tuition alone. One day the state should help."

"Many of our parents are having difficulty paying our low fee. Any assistance to them would be a benefit to the school since we are operating on a bare minimum right now."

"Many very promising children are forced to the state hospital because the family cannot finance their care. Some day I hope that the state can pay the tuition, which is much less than hospitalization, and leave those in the community that are satisfactorily placed."

"There is a need for some sort of financial assistance to parents as most of them have expressed an inability to meet our price of \$300."

"Financial assistance to the parents. Many parents would keep their children with us rather than send them to state hospitals if they had partial assistance with the monthly rate."

"If at all possible, to be able to help parents of a retarded child financially if they should need help to place their child in a private home. So many parents want to do this, but cannot afford it."

"There is a terrific need for these homes for retarded children to relieve the load at state hospitals. They can get a lot more care and attention where there are a few, rather than 40 or 50 in a ward. So many people come to me wanting to leave their children. They are not eligible for welfare, but if they could just have part help they could afford one-half of it."

2) There is a need for money to be made available to private institutions for the expansion of services and facilities. This need was almost unanimously expressed. There were two general types of suggestions: One was through an increase in rates, thus giving the private institutions capital with which to expand. The other type of suggestion was to make money available on a low interest loan basis to the private institutions so they could expand. Many persons indicated they had tried to get loans for expansion from traditional sources but found that these sources would not readily loan money for such purposes. A suggestion was made to have the state contract with private facilities for the care of children in order to guarantee that a certain necessary percentage of beds would always be filled, thus assuring the private facility that it will be able to meet the fixed

costs of operation. Any beds filled over this base percentage, then, would result in available capital for the facility to expand, or would assure the traditional lending agencies that their loans for expansion could be repaid.

#### Examples

"Loaning agents, banks, savings and loan associations, and etc., are not interested in financial aid for construction of new units and expansion of existing units because of insecure income. Under the present state program we could be empty within a matter of days. For example, in January 1962, the institution at Porterville took custody of six children. It is our belief that this was not necessary. Since that time, several of the parents have expressed that they wished their children had remained with us. After this drain, it was nine months before we were at capacity."

"We feel that state aid in some cases would be a tremendous help and would take less of the taxpayers' money than transferring children to a state hospital."

"One suggestion would be to give assistance for expanding facilities through state grants or non-interest loans."

"Some type of financial aid where loans can be made at low interest rates so private institutions can afford to expand."

"Seems the major problem is sufficient money to build or enlarge facilities -- the monthly income is not adequate to allow more than day-to-day type existence."

"Pay more fees for family home care. Especially where there is no other help for clothes, medical care, etc. The county and state top pay is \$150 per month. With food and clothing as high as they are, I don't think \$150 is enough. I think more family home care programs would expand if the fee was somewhat higher."

"There is a need for state aid in financing existing homes for expansion of housing facilities and improvement."

3) There is a lack of communication and coordination between the various agencies that place retarded children. There is need for a plan which would coordinate placement activities to make better use of private facilities.

### Examples

"By not uprooting these children. They thrive on routine and regress when their routine is changed and go to another type of care."

"If the state hospital would release patients who could benefit by family care to homes of people who want them, many people would license their home for this good work. I have tried to get children from Sonoma, but as crowded as they are, they would not release."

Ed. Note: This statement came from a home in Sonoma County. In a recent public hearing the low rate of utilization of the home care program by Sonoma State Hospital was explained by indicating there is a lack of available homes.

"If the welfare was state-wide and not just county. I have just today lost a patient because the parents moved from one county to another. So the first county would no longer pay for the care of the child."

"I have suggested that the children only be transferred on paper when they are called up for the State hospital, which would save a lot of time, work and money for the State. But because my license is through the Department of Mental Hygiene in Los Angeles, the State Hospital will not recognize my license, and the children have to be moved when their time comes. In a lot of cases they are just put into another Foster Home. .... transferring them so often does not help them and also is a lot of work and money."

4) Another area considered in need of attention was the need for the re-examination of licensing and zoning restrictions as they apply to the private facilities. Many felt that their facilities could handle more children than are presently allowable under the existing restrictions. Zoning problems, in many cases, hampered expansion. Others felt that some of the requirements for licensing were unrealistic and too rigid to allow for the exceptional case.

### Examples

"Increase the number of children per license and increase the monthly rates so we can do more for them, dress them nicer and feed them better."

"Make the zoning change that would make it easier to take more children. I have room for 6 boys and am only allowed to take 3, which seems like a waste of space for boys that need a home and care."

"More leniency on license for temporary emergency cases."

"Remove some of the restrictions that are impossible to comply with in an ordinary home. Allow both ambulatory and non-ambulatory to be cared for in the same home. ... Have the investigators check food, clean beds, play area and reasonable safety measures instead of wasting time on thermometers in refrigerators, progress reports, how beds are placed in a room, and requiring Dr.'s to sign at each visit or phone conversation in spite of proof of required physical plus receipts on all medication."

"Revise rules and requirements to be more realistic. For instance, 50 square feet per twin bed is understandable, but for two bassinets in a 10' x 10' room, one can't stay in business."

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## Appendix

The following is a list of all the private facilities licensed to care for the mentally retarded in California. The facilities are grouped according to the type of care provided and are arranged according to county.

The information given about each facility includes the type of patient admitted to each facility, the licensed capacity of the facility, the number of resident vacancies in each facility at the time of the study, and the approximate rates. All 225 of the private facilities in the state are listed in this appendix. Those facilities that responded to the questionnaire are marked with \*.

Resident care facility is an institution of seven-bed capacity or more intended solely for the admission of mentally retarded patients whose primary need is protective supervision.
